### Research Reactor

In the last newsletter, we presented an Op-Ed piece by Fred Davison discussing the Energy Park idea. One of the ways we have talked about to get the energy park off the ground is to build a research and teaching reactor to be operated by a consortium of Southeastern universities. Many universities have shut down their own reactors and the number of students in nuclear engineering has declined. In the Southeast, there are only 2 university reactors left, one at the University of Florida and one at North Carolina State. There is already a growing deficit in nuclear-trained graduates and that deficit will increase.

On September 19, 2001, CNTA met with South Carolina Universities Research and Education Foundation (SCUREF), the Education, Research and Development Association of Georgia Universities (ERDA), Georgia Tech, the University of Tennessee, South Carolina State University, the University of South Carolina, the Economic Development Partnership and Westinghouse Savannah River Company to talk about getting this idea off the ground. That meeting took a great stride forward in the effort of building a new Southeast research and teaching reactor at SRS. Currently we are arranging a meeting with Bill Magwood and key Congressmen in Washington to brief them on the meeting of September 19th. In the meantime, a plan is being laid out for an "organizing workshop" in November. A Steering Committee was formed to prepare and plan the workshop. That Committee is made up of Susan Wood (WSRC/SRTC) (Mel Buckner as her designee), Mal McKibben (CNTA), John Palms (University of South Carolina) (Ralph White as his designee), and Leroy Davis (South Carolina State University) (Jim Anderson as his designee). Other committee formed include a Functional Specifications Committee to layout what the requirements are for this reactor. The members of the Functional Specifications Committee are Jim Tulenko (University of Florida), Tom Parkinson (CNTA), Tim DeVol (Clemson), Larry Miller (University of Tennessee), John Valentine (Georgia Tech), and Ken Spicer (Medical University of South Carolina). The third committee formed at this meeting was an Organizational Options Committee to consider how to organize this consortium or coalition, look into models that should be considered, and explore ideas such as user fees, etc. Members of this Committee are Craig Williamson (SCUREF), Ratib Karam (ERDA), Charlie Sparrow (Mississippi State University), Ernie Chaput/Fred Humes (Economic Development Partnership). We will also pursue stakeholders, Nuclear Energy Institute, etc. for the workshop. It is hoped that the commercial nuclear industry will support the project financially as the long-term goal is to train people for nuclear industries.

This is an initiative with lots of potential benefits for SRS and the CSRA, and CNTA is excited to be the mid-wife. We will keep you informed as progress is made.

#### **Change In Tax Status**

CNTA has taken a step forward in trying to broaden our financial base, as well as providing a new benefit to our membership. In the past, we have been registered under Internal Revenue Service Code 501(c)(6). Because of changes in the IRS Code, CNTA now qualifies as an educational organization under Internal Revenue Service Code 501(c)(3), an educational non-profit organization. This will not only allow our membership to deduct membership dues and contributions to CNTA as of October 1, 2001, but it also allows CNTA to submit proposals to grant-making foundations and organizations, which we hope will allow CNTA to grow and become a national voice of reason on nuclear subjects.
