CNTA Accepting Applications for 2025 High School Essay Contest

Local students have a chance to win up \$1,000 in scholarships from Citizens for Nuclear Technology Awareness (CNTA).

CNTA's High School Essay Contest applications are open. High school juniors and seniors in South Carolina, or Burke, Columbia, and Richmond counties in Georgia are invited to submitted essays. High school juniors and seniors of CNTA members, regardless of their county of enrollment, are also eligible.

Awardees will receive one of three prize amounts, with \$1,000 going to the top essay. Three additional prizes of \$500 each will be awarded to the top entries focused on topic #1 below.

The essay should be 1,000-to-1,500 words and discuss one of the following topics:

- 1. Explain what spent nuclear fuel is and the pros and cons of the United States having one central interim repository for these materials.
- 2. There are numerous applications of nuclear technology in the medical industry, such as radioisotopes for medical diagnostics, or therapies. Some of them have been around for many years, and others are being developed. Discuss at least two uses of nuclear technology in medicine and their impact.
- 3. How is the United States' security linked to comprehensive deterrence? What role does our nuclear deterrence play in our overall security and how are we working to enhance our global position?

"Successful essays require students to integrate science, technology, social understanding, and language arts," said Allison Molnar, CNTA Executive Director. "Researching a technical topic, relating the information to society, and effectively communicating the information are great skills for any high school student to practice and demonstrate. The CNTA Essay Contest provides an incentive for the development of written communication skills that are vital to continued success in education and in the workforce."

The deadline to submit essays is February 28, 2025. Contest winners will be recognized at the 2025 Annual Edward Teller Banquet and will be invited to attend a summer Up & Atom breakfast to be recognized.
